"When the days drew near for [Jesus] to be taken up, he set his face to go to Jerusalem." Luke 9:51

Nevertheless, it captures the resoluteness of Jesus on the journey to the cross. It seems as if the disciples are trying to get him to reconsider or at least slow down. Jesus, though, remains deliberate and moves toward the Holy City and his destiny – for us!



While Lent is not the happiest time in the church calendar it is a vital time in which we are invited to join with Jesus on the road to Jerusalem. We begin on Ash Wednesday as we remember that we are mortal, and we need a Savior.

We follow Jesus in our worship and in our acts of spiritual discipline and self-denial. We enter Jerusalem with Jesus on Palm Sunday, join him at the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday, stand vigil with him at the cross on Good Friday, and walk with the women to the tomb on Easter Sunday.

A Diverse Community: The Community of Faith

"As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. We are all the body of Christ."

~ Galatians 3:27-28



Most of us spend our time within groups of similar oriented people. We work with people who have the same knowledge base as us. We live with people who share our genetics. We socialize with people who are our approximate age or have similar life experiences. We gather with like-minded people and people who share our passions, ideas, and who have other similarities.

However, the church is one of the places where that is not necessarily true. We share a belief system, or at least broad beliefs about Jesus and God. But that is where the similarities end. Our community of faith includes the old and the young, those who are working and those who are not, men and women and everything in between, liberal and conservative, people of different colors and ethnicities, and many other differences.

Being a community together is not always easy. We tend to focus on the things that are most important to us. If you do not have children at home anymore, it can be difficult to care about the Sunday school or the nursery. If you are working all the time, it can be hard to care about the mid-day Bible studies and groups that are meeting. If you are a young family, it can be difficult to care about the evening events, or the fellowship activities that you can't get away for. And yet, we are a community together. The way we gather on Sundays for worship is truly an indicator that we are a community together, and the more we recognize, support, and honor the ministries that are important to others, the better connected we will be as a community of faith.

One example of how we are going to do this in the near future is our midweek Lenten program. This year, the evenings will be truly inter-generational. This means that adults will need to have patience with the children, and the children will need to be understanding of the adults and their needs. If those things happen, together we have the opportunity to worship and to learn. Come join us for this special five week journey during Lent. Worship will include a soup supper, activities for everyone, and an opportunity to learn something new about some of the stories in the Bible and about our baptism.

Dear Sisters & Brothers in Christ at St. Andrew, Good Shepherd, & Prince of Peace,

Saturday, March 16th is National Quilt Day. You are invited to St. Peter Lutheran Church on State Route 9, Malta, NY, across from the Malta Drive-In, to celebrate this age-old craft and the LWR Mission Quilt project.

Join us any time between 10:00 a.m. – Noon for a cup of coffee and a sweet treat. If you have the time, help us tie a few quilts for LWR. You can also take a look at the ones we have completed to date that are ready to ship this May to the LWR warehouse. We'll also have a sample of a "fleece tied" blanket that LWR accepts for distribution around the world.

Since 2010 a small group of women at St. Peter's have been meeting on a couple of Saturdays every month during the fall and winter to assemble and tie quilts for Lutheran World Relief. They have sent over 140 quilts to LWR which then have been sent on to places around the world including Tanzania, Mali, India, Ethiopia, Georgia (the country in the Eurasia region), and Burkina Faso (a country in West Africa).

Besides sending the gift of hope around the world through the quilts, the time spent creating the quilts are gifts of fellowship and friendship among those whose hands touch the material and thread.

Anyone interested in this ministry is welcome to come and find out more about how you can help LWR send messages of hope around the world. Bring a friend, your sister, daughter, son, cousin, you get the picture – **all are welcome**.

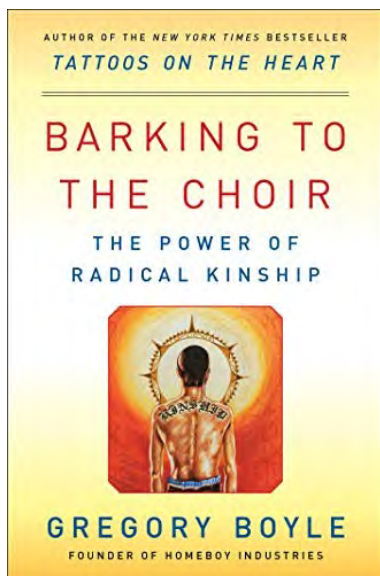


March Activity

Shrove Tuesday - Tuesday, March 5th

Shrove Tuesday is the day before Lent starts, the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday. It's a day of penitence, to clean the soul, and a day of celebration as the last chance to feast before Lent begins.



Religiously there is more to Shrove Tuesday than pigging out on pancakes. Shrove Tuesday gets its name from the ritual of shroving that Christians used to undergo in the past. In shroving, a person confesses their sins and receives absolution for them.

The pancakes themselves are part of an ancient custom with deeply religious roots. In the old days there were named foods that observant Christians would not eat during Lent... food such as meat and fish, fats, eggs, and milky foods. So that no food was wasted, families would have a feast on shroving Tuesday, and eat up all the foods that wouldn't last the forty days of Lent without spoiling. Pancakes became

associated with Shrove Tuesday as they were a dish that could use up all the eggs, fats and milk in the house with just the addition of flour.

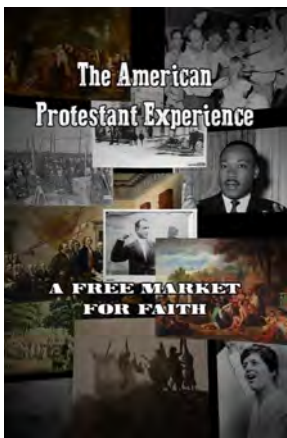

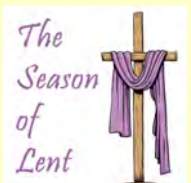

Water Stories of the Bible and What They Tell Us about Baptism

Wednesdays in Lent this year will focus on 5 water stories of the Bible. We will explore Noah and the Ark, the Israelites crossing the Red Sea, Naaman being healed of leprosy, Jesus turning water into wine, and the Ethiopian eunuch. Each story shows how God brings healing and salvation through water and can teach us something about our baptism and our life together as members of God's family.



The program will be completely intergenerational this year, so bring the family and work together to learn and create each week with others. Worship will encompass the entire evening, including dinner, activities, fellowship, and music. The evenings begin at 6pm and will end by 7:30pm. Please join us in the Fellowship Hall for worship, fellowship, learning, and fun as we explore the Bible stories and our baptisms.

Faces of Faith



Jonathan Fuller grew up Roman Catholic in Western New York, but lapsed from the faith after leaving home and spent his college years more or less agnostic. While engaged in intensive music studies, however, he found a few sacred pieces that were incredibly passionate and perfect in construction — he couldn't understand how they existed without divine inspiration. In this way, despite more or less renouncing the church he grew up in, he never fully lost sight of God's presence. When speaking of that period now he refer to himself as "99% agnostic" — those three or four musical works were responsible for the other 1%.

Jon credits his wife Betsy for patiently guiding him to the Christian faith over a number of years. He became a member of the ELCA in 2008 and was immediately captivated by Lutheran congregational singing; he is still moved and fulfilled by the joyful singing and hymnody he hear every Sunday. Since he started playing organ in 2015, his faith has grown substantially through involvement in the liturgy and connecting with people, whether musicians or non-musicians. Jon has discovered new depths to his personal faith through studying and playing liturgical organ music, much of which reflects the composer's reverence, faith and passion — he find these characteristics contagious.

Jon's faith journey has never been straightforward. He still struggle to reconcile faith and reason, in particular. He went through a stereotypical "Buddhist phase" and stubbornly holds fast to the formal prayer and Marian veneration of his Catholic background. For better or worse, he sees his faith as a patchwork one that regularly surprises him.

Maybe the most important lesson Jon has learned on this journey is that one doesn't have to unflinchingly believe every bit of doctrine and creed to enter a faith community — this idea held him back in his spiritual growth for years. He found that his faith requires doubt and critical thinking and has evolved over time; it is messy and sometimes a journey of seeking and not finding.

Jon has been organist and senior choir director at Prince of Peace since January 2018. Prior to arriving at PoP he was organist for two years at St. Andrew Lutheran Church, where he worked with Pr. Joyce Fiore. Jon's tenure there followed eight years off from playing music after graduating with a Bachelors of Music degree in Horn Performance from SUNY Fredonia. During those years Jon stumbled into a career as a writer, editor and journalist at IEEE GlobalSpec in Albany, where he's worked since 2010.

Jon married Betsy Stambach, a lifelong Lutheran, in 2007. Betsy teaches choir and theatre at South Glens Falls High School. They have two children, Evelyn and Timothy, whom you may have seen turning pages during anthems or lying on the floor during service, respectively. In the rare moments he's not working, with family or doing something musical, Jon enjoys exploring the Adirondacks and the outdoors in general.

Having a water point nearby also means that children spend less time walking long distances to fetch water, leaving more time for their studies.

After breakfast, it's time for Kereni to go to school! Education is the key to breaking the cycle of poverty.

Sending children to school is a challenge for many families in rural Uganda. The government has mandated universal primary and secondary education, but families still have to pay school fees and buy uniforms and supplies. Your gifts help ensure that family income isn't a barrier to the life-changing education children need so desperately.

Back at home after a day of learning and fun with friends, Kereni is excited to see her mom. They talk about the many things that Kereni learned at school that day. Before long, the sun has set behind the palm trees, signaling dinnertime.

Kereni and her family eat by the light of a kerosene lamp before sleepiness sets in. Then Kereni slips through the darkness into bed, belly full. She sleeps under the mosquito net that your support helped to provide to keep her safe from deadly malaria. And she dreams of a bright future that you are helping to make a reality.

Off to school! A reliable source of water in the community means children have more time for learning.

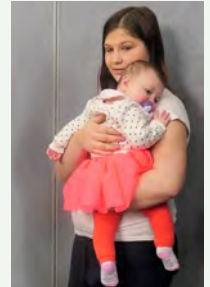
- What: *International Day of Forests*

Lenten Soap Collection



Lutheran World Relief since the end of WWII has served people in need around the world. Through the Quilts, Fleece Tied Blankets, Kits, Soap and assistance through other programs they practice what Isaiah 40:1 says, *“Comfort ye, comfort ye my people, saith your God.”*

Prince of Peace will again host the third stop of a semi-truck in Upstate New York sponsored by LWR to collect area donations of Quilts, Fleece Tied Blankets, Kits and soap on May 11, 2019. For the third year to help fill the truck with donations, we are collecting new bars of soap for LWR during the six weeks of Lent. Soap keeps hands clean, aids with self-esteem, but most of all helps people stay healthy.

Donate any brand of soap in its original wrapping – bath size bars (4 to 5 oz.) are preferred. Multi packs you find at Sam’s or BJ’s would be great.

Here is what we collected during Lent the last two years:

2017 - 511 bars of new soap, weighing 144 lb

2018 – 640 bars of new soap, weighing 164 lb.

2019 – ??? Could we reach 700 bars of soap?
